(iv) analyze the social, political and religious dynamics of pre-exilic and post-exilic ancient Israelite society, (v) explain the concepts of inspiration and canonicity and methods employed in Biblical Studies. (vi) explain the principles of sectarian Judaism, (vii) identify the dynamics of the prophetic tradition as opposed to sectarian Judaism, (viii) isolate the historical kernel of the Gospel narratives, (ix) trace the formation and the development of Christian thought on the founder of Christianity in the course of history, (vx) integrate the liberative values of the inclusivist stand and the praxis of the founder of Christianity.

Roman and Jewish sources, and the canonical and non-canonical (apocryphal) texts on the historical Jesus; historical-critical research on the relationship between John the Baptist and Jesus of Nazareth, the Kingdom of God, miracles, table fellowship, God of Jesus, death and resurrection of Jesus; the formation of NT Christology, the development of Christology in the course of history and recent trends in Christology (4Q)</p>
